

# Airlines flying to China

<b>1. AEGEAN AIRLINES</b> Greece	Star Alliance Group. Cancelled all flights to mainland China
<b>2. AEROFLOT</b> Russia	<p>Due to the virus pandemic in China, Aeroflot is offering passengers booked for flights to/from Chinese destinations to change their flight dates or return tickets. This applies to passengers booked for flights to/from Beijing, Shanghai, Guangzhou, Hong Kong, Harbin, and to passengers booked for code-share flights operated by China Eastern and China Southern to/from Sanya, Dalian and Wuhan.</p> <p>Passengers who booked tickets on or before 24 January 2020 for SU-flights scheduled between 24 January and 7 February can:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• change departure dates for any date before 29 February 2020;</li><li>• get a refund for tickets at sales offices where they were purchased.</li></ul> <p>Tickets that were purchased online can be returned at any of the airline's sales offices or via the contact centre.</p> <p>The service is offered at no extra cost.</p>
<b>3. AIR ALGERIE</b> Algeria	Air Algeria has decided to suspend its two weekly flights to Beijing "under temporary preventive arrangements", spokesman Amine Andaloussi announced on February 3 at the Agence Presse Presse (APS).
<b>4. AIR ASTANA</b> Kazakhstan	Kazakhstan's flag carrier will be forced to stop serving mainland China on February 3 per a government mandate to cut transportation ties following the spread of coronavirus. Reuters reported that both air and land routes between the two countries will be closed.
<b>5. AIR CANADA</b> Canada	The airline canceled all flights to Mainland China from January 30th to February 29th 2020.
<b>6. AIR CHINA</b> China	
<b>7. AIR FRANCE</b> France	<p>One of the few European airlines that served Wuhan before the closure of its airport, Air France has canceled all of its flights to mainland China. The cancellations will remain in effect only until February 9, with the airline offering relief flights to Beijing and Shanghai using volunteer crew to evacuate passengers and crew.</p> <p>Air France has also issued a travel waiver</p>

	allowing passengers to change or cancel flights until the end of February.
<b>8. AIR KORYO</b> North Korea	
<b>9. AIR NEW ZEALAND</b> New Zealand	The airline currently operates daily services from Auckland to Shanghai, which will be suspended from February 9 through to March 29, it is confirmed. Flights to Hong Kong will continue as scheduled.
<b>10. AIRASIA X</b> Malasya	
<b>11. ALITALIA</b> Italia	Could not find any information related but it is not possible to book a flight from China for the next days
<b>12. AIR INDIA</b> India	Air India is axing flights to Shanghai until mid-February and reducing service to Hong Kong. For its flights to Hong Kong, crews will be required to wear special masks and come straight home as passengers to avoid staying in the region.
<b>13. AIR KBZ</b> Myanmar	The Myanmar-based airline which operates an extensive route network to mainland Chinese cities has announced that it will cut service to Guangzhou. The city is one of over ten in China that the airline serves but no further cancellations have been announced.
<b>14. AIR MACAU</b> Macau	Air Macau has canceled a handful of flights to China for February 7, the airline's website reports. The mainland Chinese cities of Shanghai, Beijing, Chengdu, and Hangzhou are affected, though it appears the frequencies are only being cut for one day.
<b>15. AIR MADAGASCAR</b> IATA Code:	Air Madagascar is suspending its sole link between its island homeland and mainland China, according to the airline's website. Services to Guangzhou from Antananarivo will be cut for the month of February and are scheduled to resume in March.
<b>16. AIR MAURITIUS</b> IATA Code:	Air Mauritius is suspending its route between its island homeland and Shanghai, the only service to mainland China offered by the airline, according to a company press release. The carrier did not say when it will resume service but plans to reroute passengers still wanting to travel or return to the country via

	other Asian cities it serves including Hong Kong, which remains unaffected.
<b>17. AIR NEW ZEALAND</b> New Zealand	Air New Zealand is temporarily canceling service to its sole Chinese destination, Shanghai, according to the airline's website. The suspension will last until the end of March.
<b>18. ALL NIPPON AIRWAYS - ANA</b> Japan	Japan's top airline, All Nippon Airways, may need to consider suspending flights bound for China, Jiji news agency cited the company's chief executive, Yuji Hirako, as saying on Friday. The report comes as pilots and flight attendants are demanding airlines to stop flights to China as health officials declare a global emergency over the rapidly spreading coronavirus.
<b>19. AIR SEOUL</b> IATA Code:	The Korean budget airline Air Seoul extended its cancellation of flights to mainland China to include Zhangjiajie and Linyi in addition to Wuhan. The airline is one of only a few South Korean airlines to suspend service to Chinese cities outside of Wuhan following the outbreak.
<b>20. AIR SERBIA</b> Serbia	
<b>21. AIR TANZANIA</b> Tanzania	Air Tanzania pushed back its inaugural flight from Dar es Salaam to China, Reuters reported. The airline had been aiming to take advantage of China's increasing involvement in East Africa to offer flights between Tanzania's economic hub and mainland China. Safety concerns due to the virus, however, have indefinitely pushed back the flight, which would likely have been operated by the airline's Boeing 787 Dreamliner.
<b>22. AMERICAN AIRLINES</b> USA	American Airlines joined its US colleagues in suspending service to mainland China through the end of March. Service to Hong Kong remains unaffected
<b>23. ASIANA AIRLINES</b> South Korea	Korea's Asiana Airlines is suspending flights starting Saturday to three Chinese cities — Guilin, Changsha, and Haikou — because of the virus, its website said. The airline also issued a travel waiver for passengers traveling to mainland China, Taiwan, and Hong Kong.

<p><b>25. AUSTRIAN AIRLINES</b> Austria</p>	<p>Joining its fellow Lufthansa Group airlines, Austrian Airlines said it would cut services to mainland China from its Vienna hub, Reuters reported.</p>

<p><b>27. BANGKOK AIRWAYS</b> Thailand</p>	
<p><b>28. BRUSSELS AIRLINES</b> Belgium</p>	<p>Operated by Hainan Airlines</p>
<p><b>29. BRITISH AIRWAYS</b> UK</p>	<p>British Airways announced it would suspend all its flights to China until further notice. The UK's flag carrier connects London with Beijing and Shanghai.</p>
<p><b>30. CAMBODIA AIRWAYS</b> Cambodia</p>	<p>Cambodia Airways has cancelled flights to both mainland China and autonomous regions such as Macau, according to its website. The cancellations vary in length with some extending to the end of February.</p>
<p><b>31. CATHAY DRAGON</b> Hong-Kong</p>	<p>Flights directly to Wuhan operated by Cathay Dragon, have been cancelled.</p>
<p><b>32. CATHAY PACIFIC</b> Hong-Kong</p>	<p>The closest carrier to the affected region, Cathay Pacific said it would keep its flights to mainland China but cut capacity by half.</p> <p>Passengers can change or cancel flights to mainland China, less than 10 miles from the airline's base at Hong Kong International Airport. Cathay Pacific sometimes takes cues from the Chinese government, as seen during its CEO's recent resignation.</p> <p>The airline also said it would cut back on amenities such as hot towels, pillows, blankets, and magazines.</p>

<p><b>33. CEBU PACIFIC</b> Philippines</p>	<p>The Filipino low-cost carrier is scaling back the number of flights it's offering to mainland China, Hong Kong, and Macau, according to the airline's website. The reduction begins February 5 and is expected to last until the end of March. Customers on flights still operating are able to change or cancel their travel plans.</p>
<p><b>34. CHINA AIRLINES</b> Taiwan</p>	<p>Taiwan's China Airlines has cancelled some flights to cities across mainland China, though it hasn't completely suspended service, the airline's website shows. Passengers flying to Taiwan from China must also now fill out a Health Declaration Form. The airline is also allowing passengers scheduled to fly to mainland China and Hong Kong between now and the end of March to cancel or change their travel plans.</p>

<p><b>39. DELTA AIR LINES</b> USA</p>	<p>Delta has suspended all flights to China until the end of April, according to its website. The airline currently serves the country from Atlanta, Detroit, Los Angeles, and Seattle. The last Delta flight bound for China departs February 3.</p>
<p><b>40. DONGHAI AIRLINES</b> China</p>	
<p><b>41. EGYPTAIR</b> Egypt</p>	<p>Egypt's national carrier will be suspending all of its flights to mainland China indefinitely, according to the airline's website. The airline connects Cairo with the Chinese cities of Beijing, Hangzhou, and Guangzhou, with the suspensions beginning on February 1.</p>

<p><b>42. EL AL ISRAEL AIRLINES</b> Israel</p>	<p>El Al Israel Airlines is suspending its only route to mainland China from Tel Aviv to Beijing starting Friday, Haaretz reported. The airline has given a date of March 25 for the resumption of service. It will, however, continue its flights to Hong Kong.</p>
<p><b>43. EASTAR JET</b> South Korea</p>	<p>The Korean low-cost carrier is suspending services to cities across China, the airline's website reported, as well as reducing services to Macau. The suspensions are due to last until the end of February into early March.</p>
<p><b>44. EMIRATES</b> UAE</p>	<p>Due to a new mandate from the United Arab Emirates government, Emirates is being forced to temporarily suspend its services to mainland China, according to the airline's website. Flights to Guangzhou and Shanghai are affected, while the government is allowing flights to Beijing to proceed as normal. The airline is advising passengers to arrive at the airport eight hours early for screening.</p>
<p><b>45. ETHIOPIAN AIRLINES</b> Ethiopia</p>	<p>The African carrier on Jan 30 denied reports that it had suspended all flights to China. The airline's statement contradicted its passenger call centre, which told Reuters earlier in the day that flights to China had been suspended.</p>
<p><b>46. ETIHAD AIRWAYS</b> UAE</p>	<p>Joining its fellow UAE carrier Emirates, Etihad is being forced to suspend flights to all mainland Chinese cities except Beijing on order of the UAE's government, the airline's website shows. The suspension begins on February 5 and affects flights to Chengdu, Dalian, Shenzhen, and Shanghai. Later Etihad Airways said passenger flights between Beijing and Nagoya, in Japan, had been temporarily suspended due to low travel demand.</p>
<p><b>47. EVA AIR</b> Taiwan</p>	<p>Taiwan's EVA Air and its subsidiary UNI Air joins China Airlines in changing its flight schedule for services to mainland China, according to the airline's website. The two help make up the air bridge between mainland China and Taiwan, despite tensions between the two governments. Initially only offering a travel waiver for flights to Wuhan, the airline has extended its change or cancel policy to include any city in mainland China, as well as the regions of Hong Kong and Macau.</p>
<p><b>48. FINNAIR</b> Finland</p>	<p>One of the European airlines with numerous routes to China, Finnair had held out on canceling all services outright. The Finnish flag carrier will stop flying to all mainland Chinese cities beginning February 6 until the end of the month.</p>

	<p>The airline focuses heavily on Asian services, connecting Europe and Asia via its hub in Helsinki and offering a stopover program to encourage visitors from both continents. Multiple Chinese airlines also use the city as a stopover for other cities in Europe.</p> <p>Passengers flying on any Finnair flight to Hong Kong until the end of February can also change or cancel their flights.</p>
<p><b>49. GARUDA INDONESIA</b> Indonesia</p>	<p>Temporarily halt flights to and from China starting Feb. 5 to prevent the spread of the new coronavirus in Indonesia. Garuda operates 30 flights per week to China.</p>
<p><b>50. GRAND CHINA AIR</b> China</p>	
<p><b>51. HAINAN AIRLINES</b> China</p>	<p>China's Hainan Airlines suspended its flights between Budapest, Hungary, and Chongqing from Feb 7 until March 27, Budapest Airport said on its Facebook page.</p>
<p><b>52. HIMALAYA AIRLINES</b> Nepal</p>	<p>Himalaya Airlines announced that it would be cutting services to neighboring China, according to its website. The airline, whose homeland shares a large border with China to its north, currently serves Beijing, Chongqing, Changsha, and Guiyang from its Kathmandu hub.</p> <p>Service to China will be reduced indefinitely and passengers on unaffected flights will be allowed to change or cancel their plans.</p>
<p><b>53. HONG KONG AIRLINES</b> Hong-Kong</p>	<p>Hong Kong Airlines is joining in with Cathay Pacific in scaling back service to mainland China, according to the airline's website. Major cities including Beijing, Shanghai, Chongqing, and Nanjing, as well as smaller cities across the country, are affected.</p> <p>The airline has only announced cancellations until February 11, a much sooner date than most airlines that have cut services to China. A travel waiver is also in effect for mainland China-bound passengers, though only for travel before February 11.</p>
<p><b>54. IBERIA</b> Spain</p>	<p>The Spanish flag carrier is joining in with its sister airline British Airways in suspending flights to China for the month of February, according to the airline's website. The suspension starts on January 31 and affects the carrier's Madrid-Shanghai route, its only route to mainland China.</p>

<p><b>55. INDIGO</b> India</p>	<p>The low-cost Indian airline IndiGo is cutting service to Chengdu and Hong Kong beginning Saturday, it will keep service to Guangzhou.</p>
<p><b>56. IRAERO AIRLINES</b> Russia</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled indefinitely, following government decision</p>
<p><b>57. JAL - JAPAN AIRLINES</b> Japan</p>	<p>By directives enforced by the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism of Japan, entry to Japan will not be permitted for passengers below (effective February 1st Saturday), 2020 until further notice:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Any non-Japanese passport holders visited Hubei Province, People's Republic of China in the past 14 days at the time of arrival in Japan.</li> <li>- Passport holders issued by Hubei Province, People's Republic of China.</li> </ul>
<p><b>58. JETSTAR ASIA</b> Australia</p>	<p>The low-cost carrier Jetstar Asia is canceling services to the mainland Chinese cities of Hefei, Guiyang, and Xuzhou from Thursday to the end of March, its website said. The airline has also issued travel waivers allowing passengers to change or cancel flights to the country.</p>
<p><b>59. JETSTAR PACIFIC</b> Australia</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled until 01 May following Government decision</p>
<p><b>60. JIANGXI AIRLINES</b> China</p>	
<p><b>61. KENYA AIRWAYS</b> Kenya</p>	<p>Kenya Airways will be suspending its Nairobi to Guangzhou route beginning Friday, the airline's website states. The city is the only one in mainland China served by Kenya's flag carrier, with the next nearest destination being Bangkok. Services remain suspended indefinitely.</p>
<p><b>62. KLM ROYAL DUTCH AIRLINES</b> Netherlands</p>	<p>KLM is suspending service to three cities in mainland China beginning Thursday including Xiamen, Chengdu, and Hangzhou, the airline announced. Services to Beijing and other Chinese cities and Hong Kong remain unaffected, though it will scale back frequencies to Shanghai. The airline claimed that it doesn't see a reason to cancel services to mainland China outright, as many European airlines are doing, but will allow passengers to change or</p>



	cancel flights to the country.
<b>63. KOREAN AIR</b> South Korea	Korean Air is cancelling flights to nine mainland Chinese cities beginning the first week of February, the airline's website shows. Flights to Tunxi, Qingdao, Beijing, Nanjing, Shenyang, Shanghai, Zhangjiajie, Changsha, and Kunming from cities across South Korea are affected until late February.

<p><b>73. MYANMAR NATIONAL AIRWAYS</b> Myanmar</p>	<p>Myanmar's flag carrier will suspend services to mainland China and Hong Kong, the Economic Times reported. The state-owned airline currently serves one destination in mainland China, Chengdu.</p>

Scheduled services to the country are unaffected though a travel waiver is in place for flights until the end of February.</p>
<p><b>80. QANTAS</b> Australia</p>	<p>Australia's national carrier has suspended its service to mainland China, its website shows. The airline connects Australia's capital city of Sydney with Beijing and Shanghai.</p>
<p><b>81. QATAR AIRWAYS</b> Qatar</p>	<p>Qatar Airways is suspending service to mainland China, its website shows. The airline serves Beijing, Shanghai, Chongqing, and Guangzhou. The airline is the first of the three main Middle Eastern carriers to suspend all</p>

	services to China, though service to Hong Kong remains unaffected.
<b>82. ROYAL MAROC</b> Morocco	Morocco-based Royal Air Maroc will temporarily stop flying between Casablanca and Beijing, the airline stated in a social media post. Its sole route to China was also one of the longest in its route network. The airline stated the service will remain suspended until the end of February.
<b>83. ROYAL FLIGHT AIRLINES</b> Bahrain	Flights to China cancelled indefinitely, following government decision
<b>84. RWAND AIR</b> Rwanda	RwandAir will be suspending services between Kigali, Rwanda and Guangzhou, the airline's website shows. Though no date was given for the resumption of service, the carrier said it would review the situation at the end of February.

<b>86. SAS SCANDINAVIAN AIRLINES</b> Sweden, Denmark & Norway	Scandinavian Airlines announced it would suspend services to mainland China starting January 31 until the end of February, joining its Nordic colleague Finnair in doing so. The airline serves Beijing and Shanghai from its Copenhagen hub. Service to Hong Kong remains unaffected; however, passengers heading to or through the autonomous region are allowed to change or cancel their flights.
<b>87. SAUDIA</b> Saudi Arabia	The Saudi Arabian national carrier has ceased all flights between the kingdom and mainland China indefinitely, according to its website. Saudia serves the city of Guangzhou from Jeddah and Riyadh, its two hubs.
<b>88. SCAT AIRLINES</b> Kazakhstan	Another Kazakhstani airline to be affected by the government's closure of transportation links with mainland China, SCAT Airlines will be forced to suspend operations to the country on February 3. It is unclear when service will resume as it is dependent on the country's government.
<b>89. SCOOT</b> Singapore	Joining its parent company Singapore Airlines, low-cost carrier Scoot is suspending all flights to mainland China beginning February 8, according to its website. The Singaporean airline has an extensive network to mainland China and cities such as Wuhan, Harbin, Shenyang, Hangzhou, Xi'an, Nanning, Zhengzhou, Ningbo, Fuzhou, Haikou, Kunming, Nanjing, Qingdao, Tianjin,

	Jinan, Nanchang, Wuxi, and Changsha will lose service until the end of March. Routes to Hong Kong and Macau will remain open but may see some service reductions and cancellations.

<p><b>6. AIR INDIA</b> India</p>	<p>Air India is axing flights to Shanghai until mid-February and reducing service to Hong Kong. For its flights to Hong Kong, crews will be required to wear special masks and come straight home as passengers to avoid staying in the region.</p>
<p><b>7. AIR MADAGASCAR</b> IATA Code:</p>	<p>Air Madagascar is suspending its sole link between its island homeland and mainland China, according to the airline's website. Services to Guangzhou from Antananarivo will be cut for the month of February and are scheduled to resume in March.</p>
<p><b>8. AIR MAURITIUS</b> IATA Code:</p>	<p>Air Mauritius is suspending its route between its island homeland and Shanghai, the only service to mainland China offered by the airline, according to a company press release. The carrier did not say when it will resume service but plans to reroute passengers still wanting to travel or return to the country via other Asian cities it serves including Hong Kong, which remains unaffected.</p>

<p><b>9. AIR NEW ZEALAND</b> New Zealand</p>	<p>Air New Zealand is temporarily canceling service to its sole Chinese destination, Shanghai, according to the airline's website. The suspension will last until the end of March.</p>
<p><b>10. AIR SEOUL</b> IATA Code:</p>	<p>The Korean budget airline Air Seoul extended its cancellation of flights to mainland China to include Zhangjiajie and Linyi in addition to Wuhan. The airline is one of only a few South Korean airlines to suspend service to Chinese cities outside of Wuhan following the outbreak.</p>
<p><b>11. AIR TANZANIA</b> Tanzania</p>	<p>Air Tanzania pushed back its inaugural flight from Dar es Salaam to China, Reuters reported. The airline had been aiming to take advantage of China's increasing involvement in East Africa to offer flights between Tanzania's economic hub and mainland China. Safety concerns due to the virus, however, have indefinitely pushed back the flight, which would likely have been operated by the airline's Boeing 787 Dreamliner.</p>
<p><b>12. AMERICAN AIRLINES</b> USA</p>	<p>American Airlines joined its US colleagues in suspending service to mainland China through the end of March. Service to Hong Kong remains unaffected</p>
<p><b>13. AUSTRIAN AIRLINES</b> Austria</p>	<p>Joining its fellow Lufthansa Group airlines, Austrian Airlines said it would cut services to mainland China from its Vienna hub, Reuters reported.</p>
<p><b>14. BRITISH AIRWAYS</b> UK</p>	<p>British Airways announced it would suspend all its flights to China until further notice. The UK's flag carrier connects London with Beijing and Shanghai.</p>
<p><b>15. CAMBODIA AIRWAYS</b> Cambodia</p>	<p>Cambodia Airways has cancelled flights to both mainland China and autonomous regions such as Macau, according to its website. The cancellations vary in length with some extending to the end of February.</p>
<p><b>16. CZECH AIRLINES</b> Czech Republic</p>	<p>EU Del received the info today that this company cancelled all flights to and from China.</p>
<p><b>17. DELTA AIR LINES</b> USA</p>	<p>Delta has suspended all flights to China until the end of April, according to its website. The airline currently serves the country from Atlanta, Detroit, Los Angeles, and Seattle. The last Delta flight bound for China departs February 3.</p>
<p><b>18. EGYPTAIR</b> Egypt</p>	<p>Egypt's national carrier will be suspending all of its flights to mainland China indefinitely, according to the airline's website. The airline connects Cairo with the Chinese cities of Beijing, Hangzhou, and Guangzhou, with the suspensions beginning on February 1.</p>

<p><b>19. EL AL ISRAEL AIRLINES</b> Israel</p>	<p>El Al Israel Airlines is suspending its only route to mainland China from Tel Aviv to Beijing starting Friday, Haaretz reported. The airline has given a date of March 25 for the resumption of service. It will, however, continue its flights to Hong Kong.</p>
<p><b>20. EASTAR JET</b> South Korea</p>	<p>The Korean low-cost carrier is suspending services to cities across China, the airline's website reported, as well as reducing services to Macau. The suspensions are due to last until the end of February into early March.</p>
<p><b>21. ETHIOPIAN AIRLINES</b> Ethiopia</p>	<p>The African carrier on Jan 30 denied reports that it had suspended all flights to China. The airline's statement contradicted its passenger call centre, which told Reuters earlier in the day that flights to China had been suspended.</p>
<p><b>22. FINNAIR</b> Finland</p>	<p>One of the European airlines with numerous routes to China, Finnair had held out on canceling all services outright. The Finnish flag carrier will stop flying to all mainland Chinese cities beginning February 6 until the end of the month. The airline focuses heavily on Asian services, connecting Europe and Asia via its hub in Helsinki and offering a stopover program to encourage visitors from both continents. Multiple Chinese airlines also use the city as a stopover for other cities in Europe. Passengers flying on any Finnair flight to Hong Kong until the end of February can also change or cancel their flights.</p>
<p><b>23. GARUDA INDONESIA</b> Indonesia</p>	<p>Temporarily halt flights to and from China starting Feb. 5 to prevent the spread of the new coronavirus in Indonesia. Garuda operates 30 flights per week to China.</p>
<p><b>24. HONG KONG AIRLINES</b> Hong-Kong</p>	<p>Hong Kong Airlines is joining in with Cathay Pacific in scaling back service to mainland China, according to the airline's website. Major cities including Beijing, Shanghai, Chongqing, and Nanjing, as well as smaller cities across the country, are affected. The airline has only announced cancellations until February 11, a much sooner date than most airlines that have cut services to China. A travel waiver is also in effect for mainland China-bound passengers, though only for travel before February 11.</p>
<p><b>25. IBERIA</b> Spain</p>	<p>The Spanish flag carrier is joining in with its sister airline British Airways in suspending flights to China for the month of February, according to the airline's website. The suspension starts on January 31 and affects the carrier's Madrid-Shanghai route, its only route to mainland China.</p>

<p><b>26. IRAERO AIRLINES</b> Russia</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled indefinitely, following government decision</p>
<p><b>27. JETSTAR PACIFIC</b> Australia</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled until 01 May following Government decision</p>
<p><b>28. KENYA AIRWAYS</b> Kenya</p>	<p>Kenya Airways will be suspending its Nairobi to Guangzhou route beginning Friday, the airline's website states. The city is the only one in mainland China served by Kenya's flag carrier, with the next nearest destination being Bangkok. Services remain suspended indefinitely.</p>
<p><b>29. LION AIR</b> Indonesia</p>	<p>Indonesia's Lion Air will suspend flights to the 15 cities it serves in mainland China because of the outbreak, CNA reported.</p>
<p><b>30. LOT POLISH AIRLINES</b> Poland</p>	<p>LOT Polish Airlines will stop flying to mainland China until Feb 9, the New York Times reported. The airline currently flies between its hub in Warsaw, Poland and Beijing.</p>
<p><b>31. LUFTHANSA</b> Germany</p>	<p>The Lufthansa Group announced on Wednesday that it would cut service to mainland China on Lufthansa, Swiss International Air Lines, and Austrian Airlines until the end of February, Reuters reported. Numerous routes from Lufthansa's Frankfurt and Munich hubs will be affected, including to Beijing, Shanghai, Nanjing, Qingdao, and Shenyang. Service to Hong Kong, however, remains unaffected.</p>
<p><b>32. MAHAN AIR</b> Iran</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled indefinitely, following government decision</p>
<p><b>33. MYANMAR AIRWAYS INTERNATIONAL</b> Myanmar</p>	<p>Myanmar Airways International Airways is canceling all of its charter flights to mainland Chinese destinations, as well as its scheduled service to Guangzhou according to the airline's website. The airline hasn't yet given a date as to when services will resume.</p>

<p><b>38. QANTAS</b> Australia</p>	<p>Australia's national carrier has suspended its service to mainland China, its website shows. The airline connects Australia's capital city of Sydney with Beijing and Shanghai.</p>
<p><b>39. QATAR AIRWAYS</b> Qatar</p>	<p>Qatar Airways is suspending service to mainland China, its website shows. The airline serves Beijing, Shanghai, Chongqing, and Guangzhou. The airline is the first of the three main Middle Eastern carriers to suspend all services to China, though service to Hong Kong remains unaffected.</p>
<p><b>40. ROYAL MAROC</b> Morocco</p>	<p>Morocco-based Royal Air Maroc will temporarily stop flying between Casablanca and Beijing, the airline stated in a social media post. Its sole route to China was also one of the longest in its route network. The airline stated the service will remain suspended until the end of February.</p>
<p><b>41. ROYAL FLIGHT AIRLINES</b> Bahrain</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled indefinitely, following government decision</p>
<p><b>42. RWAND AIR</b> Rwanda</p>	<p>RwandAir will be suspending services between Kigali, Rwanda and Guangzhou, the airline's website shows. Though no date was given for the resumption of service, the carrier said it would review the situation at the end of February.</p>
<p><b>43. S7 AIRLINES</b> Russia - Siberia</p>	<p>Flights to China cancelled indefinitely, following government decision</p>
<p><b>44. SAS SCANDINAVIAN AIRLINES</b> Sweden, Denmark &amp; Norway</p>	<p>Scandinavian Airlines announced it would suspend services to mainland China starting January 31 until the end of February, joining its Nordic colleague Finnair in doing so. The airline serves Beijing and Shanghai from its Copenhagen hub. Service to Hong Kong remains unaffected; however, passengers heading to or through the autonomous region are allowed to change or cancel their flights.</p>

<p><b>45. SAUDIA</b> Saudi Arabia</p>	<p>The Saudi Arabian national carrier has ceased all flights between the kingdom and mainland China indefinitely, according to its website. Saudia serves the city of Guangzhou from Jeddah and Riyadh, its two hubs.</p>

SCAT AIRLINES</b> Kazakhstan</p>	<p>Another Kazakhstani airline to be affected by the government's closure of transportation links with mainland China, SCAT Airlines will be forced to suspend operations to the country on February 3. <p><b>47. SCOOT</b> Singapore</p>	<p>Joining its parent company Singapore Airlines, low-cost carrier Scoot is suspending all flights to mainland China beginning February 8, according to its website. The Singaporean airline has an extensive network to mainland China and cities such as Wuhan, Harbin, Shenyang, Hangzhou, Xi'an, Nanning, Zhengzhou, Ningbo, Fuzhou, Haikou, Kunming, Nanjing, Qingdao, Tianjin, Jinan, Nanchang, Wuxi, and Changsha will lose service until the end of March. Routes to Hong Kong and Macau will remain open but may see some service reductions and cancellations.</p>
<p><b>48. SKYUP AIRLINES</b> Ukrainian</p>	<p>Ukrainian low-cost carrier SkyUp Airlines will be suspending services to mainland China until March, according to a social media post made by the airline. Along with Ukraine International Airlines, the airline serves the Chinese island of Hainan.</p>
<p><b>49. SWISS AIRLINES</b> IATA Code: LX</p>	<p>The Lufthansa Group announced on Wednesday that it would cut service to mainland China on Lufthansa, Swiss International Air Lines, and Austrian Airlines until the end of February, Reuters reported.</p>
<p><b>50. SWISS INTERNATIONAL AIR LINES</b> IATA Code:</p>	<p>Swiss International Air Lines has cancelled all service to mainland China from its hub in Zurich, Reuters reported. The airline serves Beijing and Shanghai from Zurich, with plans to move to Beijing's newest airport at the end of March. Service to Hong Kong is not affected.</p>
<p><b>51. THAI SMILE AIR</b> IATA Code:</p>	<p>Thai low-cost carrier Thai Smile Air has suspended all flights to mainland China for the month of February, according to the airline's website. The airline serves the cities of Chongqing, Changsha, and Zhengzhou. Service to Hong Kong has not been affected.</p>
<p><b>52. TURKMENISTAN AIRLINES</b> IATA Code: T5</p>	<p>Turkmenistan Airlines has cancelled flights between the Central Asian country and Beijing, Al Jazeera reported.</p>



<p><b>53. UNITED AIRLINES</b> IATA Code: UA</p>	<p>Chicago-based United announced cancellations, saying last flights out of mainland China will be Feb 5, running through March 28. United had previously suspended 24 US flights to Beijing, Hong Kong and Shanghai between Feb 1 and Feb 8 because of a significant drop in demand.</p>
<p><b>54. UZBEKISTAN AIRWAYS</b> Uzbekistan</p>	<p>Uzbekistan Airways starting 01FEB20 closed reservation for flights to China, where it serves Beijing and Urumqi. The suspension of reservation is scheduled until 28MAR20</p>
<p><b>55. VIETJET AIR</b> IATA Code:</p>	<p>Vietnam's VietJet Air cancelled service to mainland China starting February 1, according to the airline's website. The move is in response to the Vietnamese government restricting flights to mainland China. Services to Hong Kong remain unaffected.</p>
