CREDITS GRANTED BY NATO MEMBER COUNTRIES TO THE USSR,
THE EASTERN EUROPEAN COUNTRIES(1) AND COMMUNIST CHINATwelfth Report covering the period
up to 30th June, 1965Draft Report to the Council

The present report is the twelfth of its kind(2). It has been prepared in pursuance of the reporting procedure on credits of over 180 days granted to Communist countries(3), approved by the Committee of Economic Advisers on 18th February, 1965. However, as a member country has not found it possible to furnish information on new outstanding credits granted during the period under review and during the previous six-month period, the International Secretariat has attempted to estimate them. In addition, one member country has modified all the data on credits extended to Communist countries since 1959, and another has given new figures for the second half of 1964; consequently, the International Secretariat has amended Tables III and IV which recapitulate, on the one hand, the value of credits outstanding on the reporting dates and, on the other hand, the changes which took place between these dates.

I. MAIN FINDINGS(4)

2. By the middle of 1965, credits granted to Communist countries amounted to \$1,646.2 million, of which \$348.2 million represented credits of over five years. Compared to the level

reached on 31st December, 1964, the increase is of \$93.9 million or 6%. However, in this connection, it should be pointed out that almost no information has been received on the volume of private non-guaranteed credits granted to Communist countries and, whilst such credits as were reported by member countries up to the end of 1964 represented only a small percentage of total credits recorded in previous reports, the lack of data has slightly distorted the comparison between the situation of outstanding credits at the end of June 1965 and at the end of December 1964.

3. A better picture of the actual growth in the volume of credits emerges from the comparison of private credits guaranteed by governments outstanding at the end of 1964 and at the end of the first half of 1965. The increase in this case has been of \$180.6 million or 13%; most of it is attributable to the Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany, Bulgaria and Communist China. The evolution of these credits during the period under review has been as follows:

- (a) private guaranteed credits to the USSR fell to \$554 million, a decrease of about 6.1%;
- (b) private guaranteed credits to the Eastern European countries, taken together, rose to \$891.5 million, 25.3% above their level at the end of 1964;
- (c) private guaranteed credits to the Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany - amounting to \$121.6 million - have continued to grow vigorously; in percentage terms their increase was the highest among Eastern European countries: 87.4%;
- (d) private guaranteed credits to Bulgaria, Hungary, Rumania, Czechoslovakia and Poland increased respectively by 82.7%, 18.3%, 17.9%, 5.4% and 2%.

4. For the second time running, credits extended to Communist China grew substantially; they went up from \$74.6 million to \$111.8 million, a rise of 50%.

5. The share of the various recipient countries in the total credits outstanding as of 30th June, 1965, is the following: USSR: 33.7%, Eastern Europe: 58.6% (of which Poland: 19.7%, Bulgaria: 10.5%, Rumania: 7.8%, Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany: 7.4%, Czechoslovakia: 7.1%, Hungary: 6.1%), Communist China: 6.7%, and Mongolia, North Korea and North Vietnam together: 1%.

6. At the end of June 1965, credits of over five years granted to the USSR and to the Eastern European countries amounted to \$348.2 million, of which \$70.4 million represented the balance of government-to-government credits granted to Poland before the setting up of the reporting procedure. Private credits guaranteed

by the governments amounted therefore to \$277.8 million. The Soviet Union is the main recipient of the latter, \$150.4 million, followed by Rumania - \$29 million, Hungary - \$28.5 million, Poland - \$27.3 million, Czechoslovakia - \$26 million, Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany - \$9.3 million, Mongolia, North and North Vietnam, together - \$6.3 million, and Bulgaria - \$1 million. The share of private guaranteed credits of over five years in the total amount of outstanding credits in this category has grown from 13.6% in December 1964 to 17.6% in June 1965. In comparison with the figure reached at the end of 1964, private guaranteed credits of over five years' duration increased by \$88.8 million or 47%; the bulk of this amount represents new credits granted to Eastern European countries. New credits of over five years have a substantial share, 49.2%, in the increase (\$180.6 million) noted in the amount of private guaranteed credits between December 1964 and June 1965.

7. There has been a marked decline in NATO countries' exports to the USSR during the first half of 1965. Exports amounted to \$325.5 million only, respectively 45% and 24.7% less than during the first half and the second half of 1964. The fall has been much bigger in the case of North American exports than in that of European ones, which were even slightly higher than during the first half of 1964. The resumption this summer of very substantial wheat purchases by the Soviets will no doubt reverse this trend. However, these deals by reducing Soviet foreign exchange reserves might, as in the period January 1963/June 1964, result in a reduction of Soviet imports from Western Europe during the next few months. Exports to Eastern European countries also declined in comparison with their value during the second half of 1964, but they were still about 4.6% above their level for the first half of last year. It should be emphasised, however, that NATO European member countries' exports to Eastern Europe continued to rise and that the decline was entirely due to a sharp drop in North American sales which amounted to \$71.6 million only as against \$174.9 million for the first half of 1964 and \$167.3 million for the second half. Exports to Communist China followed a pattern similar to that of Eastern Europe, NATO European member countries' exports continued their upward movement started in 1964, whereas North American deliveries decreased. It is, however, arbitrary to correlate the curves of exports to Communist countries and of credits granted to them⁽¹⁾. To do so would be the more fallacious since the importance of credits of over five years is growing and these are even less likely than the others to correspond to exports which have taken place during the period under examination.

II. THE VARIOUS CATEGORIES OF CREDITS AND THEIR DISTRIBUTION AMONG RECIPIENT COUNTRIES

8. Private credits guaranteed by governments(1) account for 95.6% of total credits reported by member countries as outstanding on 30th June, 1965; they have increased by 13% since the end of 1964. Since the last reporting date, the level of private credits guaranteed by the governments and granted to the USSR and to the various Eastern European countries, as well as their respective share in the total for European Communist countries, have evolved as follows:

(i) USSR

- decrease of \$35.7 million, or 6.1%;
- share dropping from 45.3% (the highest percentage recorded) at the end of 1964 to 38.3% at the end of the first half of 1965.

(ii) Poland

- very slight increase of \$5 million or 2%;
- share decreasing from 19.2% to 17.6% (maximum 62.8% in January 1960).

(iii) Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany

- increase of \$56.7 million or 87.4%;
- share growing from 5% to 8.4% (previous maximum of 7.3% was reached at the end of 1962).

(iv) Bulgaria

- increase of \$77.3 million, or 82.7%;
- share has gone up from 7.2% at the end of 1964 to 11.8% at the end of June 1965.

(v) Czechoslovakia

- increase of \$5.9 million, or 5.4%;
- share decreasing from 8.5% to 8.1%.

(vi) Hungary

- increase of \$15.5 million, or 18.3%;
- share has increased slightly moving from 6.5% to 6.9%.

(vii) Rumania

- increase of \$19.4 million, or 17.9%;
- share has gone up slightly from 8.3% to 8.9%.

9. The only credits extended to Communist China and outstanding as of 30th June, 1965, were private guaranteed ones; they amounted to \$111.8 million, increasing by 50% during the period under review. Their share in the total private guaranteed credits granted to the Communist countries has increased from 5.3% at the end of 1964 to 7.1% at the end of June 1965 (the maximum share of 15.2% was reached in June 1962). Private guaranteed credits granted to the other Far Eastern Communist countries - Mongolia, North Korea and North Vietnam - declined from \$16.9 million to \$16 million and represent 1% of total private guaranteed credits.

10. Table V shows the amount of new outstanding credits granted by member countries during the second half of 1964 and the first half of 1965. However, a member country having been unable to furnish these amounts, the International Staff has had to evaluate them. New private guaranteed credits granted during the last six months of 1964 (\$499.3 million) and during the first half of 1965 (\$377.7 million) represent respectively 35.8% and 24% of the total credits in this category outstanding on 31st December, 1964, and on 30th June, 1965. Data on new outstanding credits have also made it possible to calculate the value of the reimbursements by Communist countries of private guaranteed credits received by them. Such reimbursements amounted to about \$44.7 million(1) during the second half of 1964 and to \$197.1 million during the first half of 1965. Whereas during the second half of 1964 the Soviet Union took the largest share of the new private guaranteed credits (43.0%), during the first half of 1965 its share was only equal to 5.3%. Indeed, during the latter period, the bulk of the new outstanding credits went to the Eastern European countries, in particular to the Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany, Bulgaria and Rumania.

11. Government-to-government credits(1), from which only Poland has benefited, are in the process of being progressively reimbursed and therefore their amount has again diminished slightly. No new credits of this type have been granted since NATO started to follow the trend of credits to Communist countries.

It has been agreed that, if any member country were to contemplate adopting an attitude not in conformity with the policy pursued by NATO of not granting any government-to-government credits to the USSR, such a country would immediately inform the Committee so that the matter might be discussed there (C-M(59)75, paragraph 3).
