CREDITS GRANTED BY NATO COUNTRIES TO THE
USSR, THE EASTERN EUROPEAN COUNTRIES(1) AND
THE FAR EASTERN COMMUNIST COUNTRIES

Thirteenth Report by the Committee of Economic Advisers
covering the period up to 31st December, 1965(2)

I. General Trends

By end 1965, outstanding credits granted by NATO countries to Communist countries amounted to \$1,965 million; of these \$450.4 represented credits of over five years. These credits increased by 19.5% in the last six months of the year; thus their growth after having slowed down during the first half of 1965 was stepped up slightly during the second half of the year. The overall total of new credits granted in 1965 was \$869.9 million. As Communist countries during the same period reimbursed \$370.1 million, the level of outstanding credits rose by \$499.8 million.

2. Of the total outstanding, 96.5% were private credits guaranteed by governments, the remaining being government-to-government credits(3) from which only Poland has benefited. These are slowly being reimbursed, and no new credits have been granted since 1959, when NATO started to follow the evolution of credits to Communist countries.

3. Of the \$450.4 million credits of over five years, \$69.3 million represented the balance of government-to-government credits granted to Poland before the setting up of the reporting procedure. Private credits of over five years guaranteed by governments amounted therefore to \$381.1 million. This is 20.1% of total outstanding guaranteed credits of over 180 days. The corresponding percentage at the end of 1964 was 18.7%. The increase in 1965 of credits of over five years (\$188.9 million) accounted for 37.5% of the increase (\$503 million) in the amount of outstanding private credits guaranteed by governments and for 21.7% of the total amount of new credits of this category extended (\$869.9 million).

II. Geographical distribution

4. Eastern European countries accounted for the largest part of total credits and during 1965 their share increased from 55.6% to 60.5%. Among these countries the most rapid expansion in credits over the year as a whole took place in the case of the Soviet-occupied Zone of Germany and Bulgaria; in the last six months, Rumania benefited - absolutely and percentage-wise - from the largest increase.

5. Credits to the USSR rose by 4.3% during the latter half of 1965, but this did not offset the drop in the first half of the year; over the entire year, reimbursements (\$99.4 million) exceeded new credits granted (\$87.4 million); the share of the Soviet Union in total credits fell from 40.2% in December 1964 to 29.4% in December 1965.

6. The relatively small credits to Communist China showed an extremely rapid growth during the entire year, thus increasing the share of that country from 4.8% at the end of 1964 to 8.8% at the end of 1965.

III. Credits and exports

7. Some indications are given below on the trend of exports of NATO countries to Communist countries. However, it should be borne in mind that no exact correlation is possible between the curve of such exports and that of credits, as available information does not permit the determination of the period at which the deliveries of goods, to which the credits apply, are carried out.

8. Preliminary figures indicate a rise of 7.5% in NATO countries' exports to Eastern Europe in 1965, due to the expansion of NATO Europe's sales; North American exports were very low in the first six months of the year, but they rose substantially in the last six months.

9. NATO countries' exports to the USSR appear to have dropped by 20% in 1965; although European NATO countries' exports are slightly higher than in the preceding year, North American exports do not seem to have reached more than some 52% of their record 1964 level, in spite of a sharp rise in the last six months of the year following huge wheat sales.

10. NATO countries' exports to Communist China grew by 41.3% in 1965, due to a rapid expansion of the sales of European NATO countries; North American exports fell by 23%.

(2) Until 31.7.1960 credits to Eastern Europe were reported under 2 headings: (i) Poland and (ii) all the other countries grouped together. After 31.7.1960, and until 30.6.1964, data on credits granted to each Eastern Soviet-occupied zone of Germany were given separately, but the other Eastern European countries were still grouped together. Since 31.12.1964, member countries report the amount of credits granted to each Eastern European country. Albania is not shown in the table as, apparently, no credits have been granted to it.

(3) Total credits outstanding on 31.7.61 and 31.12.61 are not comparable, since credits granted to Communist China have only been reported as from 31.12.61. Similarly, amounts outstanding on 30.6.64 and 31.12.64 are not strictly comparable as credits to Mongolia, North Korea and North Vietnam were not reported before 31.12.64. However, in this case, such credits are relatively small in comparison to the total outstanding ones, the percentage of growth is therefore hardly distorted by their addition.




